Opposite Thinking

When Thomas Cannon was three years old, his father died. After Thomas' mother remarried, the family of six lived in a three-room wooden shack without running water or electricity. As an adult, Thomas went to work with the postal service. He never made more than \$25,000 a year. Upon retirement, he and his wife lived in poverty. Yet over the course of 33 years, Thomas gave away more than \$156,000. His gifts were mainly in the form of \$1,000 checks given to people he read about in the newspaper who were going through hard times or who especially exemplified courage or kindness. A youth worker in a low-income apartment complex, a volunteer faithfully serving at an elementary school, a Vietnamese couple wanting to return home to visit, and a teenager abandoned as an infant were some of the recipients of Thomas' benevolence.

Thomas' motivation came from an incident that happened when he was a young men attending a naval signal school. When an explosion at Chicago's port took the lives of many of his shipmates, Thomas concluded that "he had been spared to help others and be a role model." This led to his passion for bying.

Cannon's biographer, Sandra Waugaman, comments, "Not many people in uld inside living in a house in a poor neighborhood without central heat, air conditioning, or a telephone, and working overtime so that they could save money to give away."¹

Give it Away

Discussion Questions: Have someone read each Bible verse aloud and then ask the corresponding question. Be sure everyone has enough time to find the Scripture before the verse is read.

1) Read <u>Philippians 2:1-4</u>. How does Paul say you can work together the one mind and purpose?



When you find encouragement from being united with Christ, comford from His ove and fellowship with the Holy Spirit, selflessness is possible.



Paul uses repetition in verse 2 to emphasize the important ity mutual love ("like minded," "same love," "one in spirit"). "Many people - even Christians e only make a good impression on others or to please themselves. But selfishness brings discord. Pau stressed spiritual unity, asking the nerefor Philippians to love one another and to be one in s . When we work together, caring for the ıd p problems of others as if they were our problems, we de Christ's example of putting others first, and nst we experience unity. Don't be so concerned impression or meeting your own needs that makin you strain relationships in God's family."1

Read <u>Philippians 2:5-no</u>. Why would Christ give up His right to be worshiped on earth?

He knew that He'd be wors and ultimately. It is the height of security to give up our rights for others. It shows we understand that giving up our rights now secures great reward for the future.



These verses are grounded in Christ's self-emptying sacrifice. God-likeness consists not in selfish grabbing but selfless giving. Crucifixion was usually reserved for slaves and terrible criminals, so it was not mentioned in polite conversation. Paul used shocking language here. Unity with Christ is absolutely necessary evidence that the gospel is at work in the community; such unity is mocked by selfish ambition and complaining.



Facilitate a brief discussion. You may want to ask: What are some practical examples of how selfish ambition and complaining destroy unity in the workplace? What self-emptying sacrifice could you make to change that?

3)	Read <u>Philippians 2:17-18</u> and <u>Numbers 28:7</u> . What did Paul mean that his life was "poured out like a drink offering"?
POINT	Like an offering of wine poured out as a sacrifice to God, Paul regarded his life as a living sacrifice.
DEEPER	The sacrificial system was instituted at Mt. Sinai (see <u>Exodus 29:38-46</u>) in order to atone for sins and facilitate fellowship with God. This was the practice until God provided His own sacrificial offering, Jesus Christ, to pay the penalty for all people and restore a right relationship with Him. Now, as believers, our faithful service is offered to God in thanksgiving for this restored relationship and as it says in <u>1 Corinthians 15:58</u> , "Therefore, my dear brothers and sisters, stand firm. Let nothing move you. Always give yourselves fully to the work of the Lord, because you know that your labor in the Lord is not in vain."
TIP	Facilitate a brief discussion. You may want to ask: How do you labe for the Lord? Do you see the work you do every day as a sacrificial offering to God?


