GROUP LEADER GUIDE

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Agenda Question #1: Read Joshua 1:5-9. Traveling for work can be very lonely. Even when your co-workers are traveling with you, they may not share your Christian values and may try to pull you in a different direction. How do these words of God spoken to Joshua encourage you to maintain your study of the Bible? Consider Joshua, he had 'huge sandals' to fill; he succeeded Moses – the same Moses God called a prophet and the same Moses, God knew face to face (see Deuteronomy 34:10). Consider the daunting task before Joshua. The task before Joshua was to "cause this people to inherit the land" (Joshua 1:6). So if anyone needed encouragement for leading a huge throng of nomadic or traveling people, Joshua did! So, God charges Joshua with three responsibilities: (1) to be strong and courageous (repeated in vv. 6, 9 and repeated with emphasis in vs. 7); (2) to not be frightened or dismayed and; (3) to be careful to do and meditate day and night on the law of God. Meditating on the law day and night here means to constantly think about God's word with the intentions of doing it or living it out. Joshua was to make the study of God's word his obsession. Joshua was to make God's word integral to who he was and what he did. God's charge to be "strong and very courageous" (vs. 7) in leading this people would be overwhelming if it were not for God's two promises: "I will not leave you or forsake you" (vs. 5) and "the Lord your God is with you wherever you go" (vs. 9). The same God who traveled with Joshua will travel with us.

Agenda Question #2: Read 2 Corinthians 5:16-20. The next time you board a flight, bus or train:

- a) How should you regard those around you? The Apostle Paul often tells us what God, through Christ, has done for us and then Paul follows with what we should do in response to Christ's work. In other words, Christ's death erased our sin penalty (see 5:14-15); this gracious Christ-act provides us the motivation to live in such a way that the love of Christ controls us (see 5:14-15 ESV). So as a result of being exonerated from the penalty of sin and as a result of Christ's love controlling us, we are called to look at mankind differently. Before his conversion, Paul regarded Christ as a false messiah because he judged Christ by worldly standards and values. Now, Paul regards not only Christ differently, but mankind too. Now Paul does not judge men and women based on their external appearances (like nationality); rather, Paul judges mankind based on the Christian-unbeliever distinction. Paul learned that nationality was important; and gender was important; but he learned that the Christian-unbeliever distinction is far more important. In sum, Paul learned to show empathy to both Christian and unbeliever alike. Paul learned to pray for Christians and unbelievers. The next time you travel, ask the Holy Spirit to enable you as a new creation in Christ to show empathy to, and to pray for those around you.
- b) How does being an ambassador for Christ affect your behavior? Before Christ, we were enemies of God and estranged from God. Now, because of God's saving activity in Christ, we have been reconciled (or have been restored) to God. As a result of being reconciled, we have been given the ministry of reconciliation and we have been enlisted to serve as Christ's ambassadors. In our contemporary context, an ambassador is one who is a personal representative of sovereigns of state and who lives in a foreign country. However, in the New Testament (see also Ephesians 6:20), ambassador means "to be, work or, travel as an envoy." God not only called Paul to travel as an envoy and to carry the message of reconciliation a capsulized version of the gospel message but God calls us to travel as an envoy of this message too. As envoys, we must speak this message of reconciliation but most importantly, we must *live out* the implications of this message of reconciliation as we travel. GROUP LEADER GUIDE

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- a) What would airports, security lines, train stations, tollbooths, parking garages, hotel front desks, etc. look like if the fruit of the Spirit was evident there? In Galatians 5:13-6:10 Paul contrasts what living by the sinful nature (or 'flesh') and living by the Holy Spirit looks like. To live by the sinful nature means to be controlled or guided by the sinful nature (and its passions and desires); similarly to live by the Holy Spirit means to be controlled or guided by the Holy Spirit (and His passions and desires). Living by our sinful nature produces 'rotten fruit' see Galatians 5:19-21; while living by the Spirit produces good and luscious fruit see Galatians 5:22-26. Now imagine what airports, security lines, train stations, tollbooths, parking garages, hotel front desks would look like if we asked the Holy Spirit to enable us to walk in line behind Him (vs. 25); those near us would benefit from the fruit of:
 - a. love a love that reflects the character and unconditional-other centered love of God;
 - b. joy to have a rejoicing and 'glass half full' deposition in spite of outward circumstances;
 - c. peace a product of God reconciling us to Himself; so we are called to be peaceful toward others;
 - d. patience to be long tempered or to take a long time to lose your cool;
 - e. kindness to be helpful to others;
 - f. goodness to express generosity to others in words and deeds;
 - g. faithfulness to be reliable or loyal; to be a person of one's word;
 - h. gentleness to show humility; and
 - i. *self-control* to have mastery over something (e.g., our emotions, our feelings, our anger, our impatience, etc.).
- b) What role can you play in making this a reality? Ask the Holy Spirit for help. Specifically, ask the Holy Spirit continually and constantly, "Lord, I want to be a honorable ambassador for you, so help me to walk in step with you so that I can produce the fruit of the Holy Spirit wherever my travels take me."

Application Question: Blackaby suggests using flight time to study the Bible or listen to Christian music, etc. Keeping the TV off in your hotel room can have many benefits. Visiting local churches or BBTs while traveling will also keep you connected to other Christians. What will be your plan to stay focused on learning God's Word and living in God's will while traveling for work?

Besides Blackaby's suggestions, consider giving an accountability partner permission to call you at your hotel and ask, "Are you studying your Bible?" Or "Are you using this time wisely to spend time with our Lord?" Traveling can be beset with many distractions or, it can provide an excellent opportunity to catch up on Bible reading, journaling, and prayer. Traveling can also, unfortunately, provide opportunities to flirt with and to yield to sin. Ask God to help you manage the myriad of distractions, and to seize these opportunities to grow closer to our Christ and Lord. [Group Leaders are encouraged to brainstorm other suggestions with their respective BBTs.]

Use the sample email below to help you personalize your own recap of your last BBT.

Thank you for a great study. Today was a blessing! I hope that you were blessed by our time, too. During our time together, we learned about the importance and struggle to maintain a devotional life while traveling.

We learned that business travel can be a challenge. As nomadic people, Joshua knows what traveling is like; yet, God encouraged him to meditate on God's word day and night as he traveled. Remember we learned that meditating on the law day and night means to constantly think about God's Word with the intentions of doing it or living it out. Said another way, we are to make the study of God's Word our obsession. We also learned that because of Christ's finished work on our behalf, we must see and regard people differently ... and not only in terms of what we see on the outside which is often superficial. We also learned because of Christ's finished work that we are now given the awesome and privileged task of being His ambassadors. As His ambassadors, we take the message of reconciliation – the gospel with us, in word and deed. Finally, we learned that if we are led by the Holy Spirit, we can produce the good and luscious fruit of the Spirit wherever our travels to take us ... and this fruit includes – love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, gentleness and self-control.
